Supporting New Members

As the work of salvation moves forward, we feel delighted to see an ever-increasing number of God's children become members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, "the only true and living church upon the face of the whole earth."

I usually think of a new convert as a rough diamond whose true beauty as a jewel will gradually be realised through a carefully crafted cutting and polishing process. This requires a masterful technique, combined with loving patience and consistent dedication.

When a diamond is extracted from the mine, it does not look beautiful. An expert with many years of training and experience has to work on it before that happens. The Lord wants every one of His children to come unto Christ and "be perfected in him." Like shining diamonds, perfected Latter-day Saints are beautiful, noble, and magnificent. Their faith and works shine as a beacon of light to the world, and there is no question that they are different and unique.

Pressing forward along the way to perfection is more often than not a daunting task. It requires considerable effort and sacrifice. It also requires perseverance. And it definitely involves knowing what to do and how to do it. In His mercy, the Lord has determined that His children need to work together, helping one another, to be successful in living the law of the gospel. When Alma the Elder gathered by the waters of Mormon, fleeing from the servants of the wicked King Noah, a "goodly number" of followers gathered together, desirous to covenant with God. Alma felt they were ready for baptism, for they were "willing to bear one another's burdens, that they may be light; . . . and . . . to mourn with those that mourn; . . . comfort those that stand in need of comfort, and to stand as witnesses of God at all times and in all things, and in all places . . . , even until death."³

New members have tasted for the first time the Spirit of God. This has happened as a consequence of members and missionaries bearing testimony to them. They have felt the truthfulness of the gospel in their minds and their hearts,

by the Holy Ghost, which has come upon them and dwelt in their hearts.⁴ Now in further fulfillment of the baptismal covenant they need to be loved and nurtured so that, through this example, they can experience even greater joy and develop the urge to do unto others as has been done unto them.

As the late President Gordon B. Hinckley (1910–2008) reminded all of us, a new convert has had to

leave past habits and even old friends and associations. This drastic departure from the old to the new ways is not an easy one, and the new convert often runs the risk of discouragement. Remember the children of Israel, when they were released from bondage in Egypt. As they experienced the hardships of life in the desert while they were led to the "promised land", they were often distraught and wished they could return to Egypt.⁵ Speaking of the new members, this was President Hinckley's prophetic challenge:

"Every one of them needs three things: a friend, a responsibility, and nurturing with 'the good word of God' (Moro. 6:4). It is our duty and opportunity to provide these things."

It is my earnest prayer that each of us will receive new converts into the Church with wide-open arms, with patience and kindness, with genuine, selfless love. In so doing, we will be a significant part of the pure and undefiled religion,⁷ we will help them shine like diamonds and we will shine ourselves even more. Ultimately, we will help them build the attributes of Christ as we build these attributes ourselves. ■

Arthur Hardy Retires

Corty years, eleven stakes, 135 seminary graduations, half a million miles. These are just part of the legacy Arthur Hardy leaves as he retires from his position as seminaries and institutes of religion coordinator.

First called as a newly returned missionary to the position of seminary supervisor for the Preston District in 1973, Arthur little suspected that this new calling would lead to a full-time occupation and a lifetime of service within the Church Educational System. His work led him first to Dublin, Ireland, in 1978 for four and a half years and then on to Loughborough, England, for the next 31 years.

Arthur's position as seminaries and institutes of religion coordinator has taken him to a total of eleven stakes to train teachers, teach students, visit classes and conduct seminary graduation ceremonies. Often this has meant early starts, but his love of what he does means he has never regarded it as a sacrifice.

"It has been a wonderful privilege to have such a career—it is more than a job, it is a vocation.

I have always loved this work; it has never been hard to get up in the mornings!"

One summer, Arthur spent hours preparing a set of 'gold plates', fashioned after the description in Church history. He painted them gold and engraved the top plate with characters from several relevant ancient languages. "They weighed some 32 pounds," he recalls. "Though the real plates probably weighed significantly more, I wanted the students to have as close an experience as possible to that of Joseph and the eight witnesses who 'hefted' them."

There are students from all over the country with special stories to tell of his time in seminary and institute.

Jacob Turner remembers volunteering to be tarred and feathered during a lesson about Joseph Smith. "Brother Hardy poured thick, cold, sticky black treacle down my bare chest," he recalls. "He then called up students from the crowd to throw feathers at me. . . . This experience always makes me sit and think about Joseph Smith, who had to endure the real thing, and he did it so that this great Church could be here today, and so that we could have the Book of Mormon."

Rachel Haws describes Arthur as "this amazing scriptorian who knew the scriptures inside out and made all of us want to know them that way too. He was inspiring to us youth, and I felt incredibly blessed we had such an amazing seminary leader." "The way he taught never left me," agrees Serose Randhawa. "He helped me love the scriptures."

Brother Hardy's patience as he taught early-morning classes, his willingness to listen to moans and troubles and his practice of always putting his students first impressed Hilary Top. "He is ultimately one of the few people that kept me on the straight and narrow as I didn't want to let him down," she confesses.

Described by one student as "a seminary legend" and by another as "a great teacher, a man who

loved his students with a great sense of humour", it is clear that Arthur has influenced many for good during his years of service. But what has he gained from his experience?

"I find it rewarding that three of our new professional seminary and institute employees are men I have taught," he comments. "Two I taught in institute and one in seminary."

To have his students continue 'the legend' and bring the scriptures to life for a new generation of youth is reward enough for this giant of a man. ■

It made me realise how strong the Church is here in Ireland".

Twenty-four students graduated from seminary, having completed four years of study, which is a real achievement. In total, 120 certificates, including completion certificates for this year's course, were awarded, and many parents travelled to Dublin to share this special occasion with their children.

Elder Herbertson addressed the students and showed them his own seminary graduation certificate. He shared that he ran three miles to seminary each day, something which has stood him in good stead as he has since participated in marathons. He also said that seminary is like a mini-MTC which would help them to prepare for missionary service and commended the students for their efforts.

The graduating students were invited to bear their testimonies, and Sister Amanda Peacock was asked to share a few words on behalf of her son Daniel, who was not there to collect his graduation certificate as he is currently serving in the China Hong Kong Mission.

The ceremony was followed by a dance during which the youth were able to strengthen existing friendships and make new ones. ■

aniel Peacock (18), a member in Bangor, Northern Ireland, recently received a call to serve a twoyear full-time mission for the Church in Hong Kong, but Daniel had also been recognised locally for his outstanding achievements in golf. Just prior to his mission call, Daniel was asked to join the Ulster squad to represent his country for the 2014 season—a call-up he declined for a different 'call'.

At the age of 14, Daniel discovered his passion for golf, and it soon became obvious he had the talent to match when he was noticed for his natural ability by Michael Bannon, who, as Rory McIlroy's coach, knows a good golfer. During his first season Daniel improved his handicap to 13 and was recommended to the Ulster Coaching Panel. The following season his handicap improved to just 5 and he went on to convincingly win the Ulster School Boy's event, with province-wide recognition for his achievements.

In addition to leading his local youth team to victory, Daniel represented the men's senior team at his local club, aged 15. In the season prior to his mission call Daniel was the only member of his team to remain undefeated, with his handicap reduced to just 2.

To Daniel's delight, his long-term goal to play for his country was then realised when he received a letter at

Earthbound Cycling to Help the Airbound!

Tive members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints cycled from London to Huddersfield, a distance of 250 miles, to raise money for the Yorkshire Air Ambulance. John Perrin (Scarborough), Michael Gore (York), Robert Siswick, Roy Blair and Michael Siswick (Huddersfield 1st ward), wearing their Huddersfield Town supporters shirts, completed the gruelling task. In conjunction with 300 fellow supporters, the five friends undertook the journey to help raise funds, through sponsorship, for a cause that is very much needed but has to be completely self-supporting in order to operate. The helicopter ambulance charity needs £10,000 a day to remain airborne.

The journey was completed in four stages. The starting point was the Emirates stadium, Arsenal's home ground in London. From there they cycled to Cambridge, a distance of 55 miles. The next stage of the journey was from Cambridge to Leicester, which was



72 miles, and from there on to Doncaster, a stretch of 85 miles. The last stage was covering the final 45 miles into Huddersfield, where all the cyclists met at the town's football ground.

They did a lap of honour as the crowd roundly applauded them. The hardest leg of the journey was from Leicester to Doncaster when they were caught in heavy rainstorms
