

Aaronic Priesthood Resource Guide 2012—Manual 1

Aaronic Priesthood holders meet in Sunday quorum meetings to:

- Conduct quorum business.
- Counsel together about their priesthood duties.
- Teach and learn the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Use this resource guide, along with *Aaronic Priesthood Manual 1* and *Fulfilling My Duty to God: For Aaronic Priesthood Holders*, to accomplish these purposes. Prayerfully choose resources that will engage young men in learning and help them strengthen their faith and testimonies.

LESSON 1

The Priesthood

Duty to God

Invite the young men to study the "Priesthood Duties" section of the Duty to God book (deacons, pages 22–23; teachers, pages 46–47; priests, pages 70–71). Point out that in this book their duties are organized into three categories: administer priesthood ordinances, serve others, and invite all to come unto Christ. Ask the young men to explain what specific duties they have within these categories. Consider inviting them to share experiences they have had fulfilling these duties. Help them see how their service has blessed others.

Discussion Questions

- How would you explain to a friend what the priesthood is?
- How can fulfilling your duties as a priesthood holder strengthen your testimony? How can it strengthen your family?

LESSON 2

The Calling of a Deacon

Duty to God

Consider reviewing the duties of a deacon as outlined in the Duty to God book (see pages 22–23).

Discussion Questions

- How does your attitude about an assignment from the bishop or quorum president affect how you fulfill it? (see D&C 107:99).
- (For teachers and priests.) What can you do to help the deacons in your ward or branch understand the importance of the Aaronic Priesthood and the significance of their callings as deacons?

Administering the Sacrament

Duty to God

Consider using the learning activities under "Administer Priesthood Ordinances" as part of this lesson (see page 24, 48, or 72 of the Duty to God book). You could also give young men time to write plans on this topic in their Duty to God books or to share experiences they have had fulfilling their plans.

Discussion Questions

- How are ward members blessed when you administer the sacrament with reverence?
- How should the sacred trust of performing priesthood ordinances affect your actions during the rest of the week?

LESSON 4

Gathering Fast Offerings

Duty to God

Consider having the young men complete the "Learn" and "Act" sections of "Serve Others" in the Duty to God book (deacons, pages 26–27; teachers, pages 50–51; priests, pages 74–75) as part of this lesson.

Discussion Questions

- What can you do to properly represent Heavenly Father and the Savior as you gather fast offerings? (see 2 Corinthians 9:7).
- Why is it important to have a good attitude about gathering fast offerings?

Faith in Jesus Christ

Duty to God

In the Duty to God book, young men are invited to learn and teach about doctrinal topics (see pages 18–20, 42–44, or 66–68). If a member of the quorum has chosen faith as one of his doctrinal topics, consider having him teach what he has learned as part of the lesson.

Discussion Questions

- How would you explain to someone what it means to exercise faith in Jesus Christ?
- What experiences have you had that have strengthened your faith in Christ?

LESSON 6

The Holy Ghost

Duty to God

Some of the young men may have chosen to learn about the gift of the Holy Ghost as part of their plan to understand doctrine (see pages 18–20, 42–44, or 66–68 in the Duty to God book). Consider asking them to come to quorum meeting prepared to share what they are learning.

Discussion Questions

• What can I do to receive daily promptings from the Holy Ghost?

 How can the Holy Ghost help me be morally clean and avoid temptations like pornography?

Discussion Questions

- What does it mean to have a mighty change of heart? (see Mosiah 3:19; 5:1–2).
- How does a mighty change of heart affect your actions or behavior?

Duty to God

Consider inviting a priest who has started his project on "Family and Friends" in the Duty to God book to teach the "Learn" part of the project (79–80) to the quorum. He could also share what his project is and experiences he has had carrying it out.

Discussion Questions

- How could your behavior contribute to a quorum member not wanting to come to church or other activities? What can you and your quorum do to help resolve such a situation?
- What should you do if you feel you have been hurt by others' bad decisions?

LESSON 12

Discussion Questions

- What are some specific examples of when you or your family has been blessed for following the prophet?

LESSON 14

Serving Others

Duty to God

Consider doing the learning activity in the "Serve Others" section in the Duty to God book (see page 26, 50, or 74) as a quorum. You could also give quorum members time during quorum meeting to make their plans to give service, or you could invite them to share the experiences they have had fulfilling their plans.

Discussion Questions

- Who in our ward or branch could help us identify opportunities for our quorum to give service?
- How will your attitude about serving others affect the way you serve? How will it affect the people you serve?

Teaching Help

- What changes could you make in your life that would make it easier for you to always choose the right?
