(Many New Testament dates are only approximate within one to seven years.
A few highlights of the Savior's ministry have been selected as representative of his activities.)

Elder James E. Talmage believes that the Savior was born on 6 Apr. 1 B.C. (See <i>Jesus the Christ</i>, pp. 104, 109.) In probability, it will be discovered that four years have been lost from our present calendar, and that the problem will one day be satisfactorily resolved.</p>
