



1. Harmony: Joseph and Emma Smith made their home in Harmony Township from December 1827 until early September 1830, when they left permanently and moved to Fayette Township, New York, because of increasing opposition in Harmony.

2. Colesville: Joseph first came to Colesville in 1826 when he took a job as a day laborer working for Joseph Knight Sr. The Knight family were among his earliest supporters and converts. Joseph preached

here often, and a large branch was established in the area. Many were baptized on the Knight farm, including Emma. The Colesville Branch moved to Ohio together in April 1831.

3. South Bainbridge: Joseph Smith continued working for Josiah Stowell Sr. on his farm at South Bainbridge in 1825-26. Joseph and Emma married here in 1827.

4. Road between Harmony and Colesville: While traveling between Colesville and Harmony,

Joseph and Oliver Cowdery received a visitation from Peter, James, and John, who restored priesthood keys, including "the keys of the kingdom, and of the dispensation of the fulness of times" (D&C 128:20; see also D&C 27:12). Neither the exact location nor the exact date of this event is known.

5. Fayette: Joseph and Emma, accompanied by Oliver Cowdery, moved temporarily to the home of Peter and Mary Whitmer in June 1829 to finish the translation of the Book of Mormon.

6. Manchester: Immediately after their marriage, Joseph and Emma moved to the Smith family farm. After Joseph obtained the golden plates from the angel Moroni and pressures began to mount, they returned to Harmony to begin the translation. Family members often traveled the 130 miles between Manchester and Harmony.
